MP Bruce-Grey-Owen Sound

Larry Miller, MP for Bruce-Grey-Owen Sound, on behalf of the Honourable Leona Aglukkaq, Minister of the Environment and the Minister responsible for Parks Canada, announced infrastructure investments totalling \$15.6 million for several Parks Canada projects across Bruce Peninsula National Park and Fathom Five National Marine Park.

This investment comes as part of the largest federal infrastructure plan in the history of Parks Canada. The investment includes work to recapitalize and renew highly visited areas of Bruce Peninsula National Park including its entrance ways and visitor centre. At the Grotto and Singing Sands Beach, investments will improve access and better direct visitor flow while protecting the surrounding ecosystems. Renewal of Cyprus Lake Campground facilities will upgrade services to this popular area. Work on several projects on Flowerpot Island in Fathom Five National Marine Park includes dock repair, trail recapitalization and the replacement of lavatory facilities.

"I am very pleased that the Federal Government will be investing in Bruce Peninsula National Park and Fathom Five National Marine Park to ensure that these parks are protected and remain open to the public," said Miller. "These parks attract a number of tourists every year who come to enjoy the great outdoors. This funding will both protect the local environment and benefit the local economy."



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
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

year, mainly on the testimony of his children who had witnessed the murder. It was the first time in Canadian history that a murder conviction was rewithout a body.

on August 1, 1952 but no one knew that at the time.

Her family in Perth County reported Helen Kendall missing a few weeks after she disappeared but the mystery unfolded very slowly. A box of blood-stained clothing was found Johnston's Harbour on September 4th but Helen

Kendall's body was never found. Her husband, Arthur James Kendall. in October of that

It was the first time in Canadian history that a murder conviction was reached without a body.

The theory at the time was that Kendall had disposed of Helen's body in Lake Scugog or the Crane River. But as Wes Rydall explained to me, there was another theory.

Wes worked for Harvey Warder's trucking and excavating business for years beginning in 1970. "Harvey was quite a historian," Wes told me. He came from a family of history buffs (his father and brother both wrote local history books) and he loved to tell a story. There was one story in particular Wes thought I'd be interested in. It concerned the Kendall murder.

Sixty-three years ago, a major improvement of Highway 6 was underway. A lot of the Bruce Peninsula's young men found themselves earning quite a good living on that project.

lifelong pals, both from Lion's Head. West always "swore up and down that's where Helen Kendall was

In the summer of 1952, the crew was building a proper bridge over the Crane River. A dozen or so people were working at that site including West and Warder.

Two of those were Fred West and Harvey Warder,

On Monday, August 4th, 1952, Fred West arrived at work and found that his bulldozer wasn't where he had left it on Friday afternoon, and that "somebody had pushed a bunch of fill in around the culvert". Nobody thought anything about it at the time.

But when the rumours of murder started, a few weeks later, Fred West put two and two together. He

believed that Helen Kendall was buried beside the culvert at Crane River. Others discounted his story — West was known to imbibe a bit on the weekend and his lack of focus on Monday mornings was a bit of a legend.

But Wes Rydall clearly remembers what Harvey Warder told him — as long as he lived, Fred West always "swore up and down that's where Helen Kendall was buried' For his part, Harvey always said that we would find out for sure when they rebuild the Crane River bridge.

As it happens, that would be now. Was Fred West right? Harvey and Fred are gone but we should know in a few weeks; the construction signs are up already.

International. Lion Hank's goal for the year he was governor was to recycle 500 bicycles and ship them to third world countries where a bike might make all the difference to someone who has to walk miles to work, or school, and to help people become independent and improve their lives and communities.

The bikes could be adult, or kids size, and even non-functioning, because they would be fixed and donated to the

The Ferndale, Lion's Head & District Lioness Club answered the call, and Lioness Mary-Anne DeVries, assisted by Lioness Jackie Souter, volunteered to head up the project here on the Bruce Peninsula. Bruce Peninsula people also answered the call. Within weeks, Mary-Anne's driveway was filled with bikes, and many of them were stashed away in bush lots until they could be picked up.

People passing by were asking to buy

the bikes. Some of them looked almost pay then they look after them better brand new.

So far, Lion Hank's project is exceeding all his expectations. His goal of 500 has now risen to more than 1.000 bicycles, with more coming. Two crate loads will be shipped overseas. The first is going to Capetown in South Africa, and this is where the Bruce Peninsula cycles will go. They are shipped to an organization that then distributes to people across Africa. People pay a minimum fee, with the theory that if they

Lion Hank liaises with a US organization called Bikes for the World. More than 100,000 used bicycles have been shipped from the U.S. so far.

In addition to helping those who

cannot afford bikes, this project also helps with recycling and keeping excess waste from our landfill sites. The Lioness Club thanks all Bruce

Peninsula people who participated in this program and who donated so generously.

## **Bayside Astronomy: Preparing For The Perseids**

As July comes to an end, Bayside Astronomy will start to gear up for one of the largest meteor showers of the year- the Perseids! This meteor shower occurs every year, but this year will be special, because normally the peak, when the shooting stars are thickest, will be at midnight and without a moon. This makes it a lot easier to see than other years because the peak is normally early in the morning and there is normally a moon that is too bright to allow for the full effect of the meteors.

Because of this unique opportunity to see the shower, Bayside Astronomy will be in two locations on August twelfth, during the shower's peak. We will be at Summerhouse Park in Miller lake, as usual, and we will also have volunteers

can learn what exactly a shooting star is, why the Perseids happens every year and answer any other questions you might have, as well as show you a few things in the telescopes if you get bored of watching

The other major event in the sky these days is the New Horizons space probe. By now the probe will have made its closest approach to Pluto some time ago, but it will take almost sixteen months to beam all the data back to earth. The crew at Bayside Astronomy will be staying on top of the new information as it comes in and will give a small update each night. There are still a lot of unanswered questions around Pluto, and the photos from the probe seem to be opening up even more mysteries. It will almost certainly

be an interesting next couple of months as new theories are proposed and our knowledge of the former planet grows.

As always, the perseid party and all our other programming is absolutely free, thanks to funding from HRSDC, secured by the Biosphere Association, and of course the hard work and dedication of all our volunteers to run the programme. The Bayside Astronomy programme runs on Fridays and Saturdays at the Lion's Head POD, Mondays at Miller's Family Camp, Wednesdays at Summerhouse Park and Thursdays at Singing Sands. The programme generally starts around 9 PM and runs as long as people stay out (normally midnight).

Bayside Astronomy is run to raise awareness about Dark Skies on the Bruce

Peninsula, a cause championed by the Bruce Peninsula Biosphere Association, as well as Bruce Peninsula Environmental Group, Bluewater Astronomical Society, and many dedicated volunteers. Since the initiation of the dark skies programme there has been a noticeable difference in the darkness of our skies on the Bruce thanks to the hard work of the volunteer groups. You can do your part by installing dark sky friendly lights (which are similar in cost to normal lights and more energy efficient) as well as simply closing your blinds at night, so light doesn't get out and people don't see in. 

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## **BPEG July Meeting - The Greenbelt: Co-ordinated Conservation**

The Hall was full to overflowing when Ontario's Greenbelt was unpacked at BPEG's July meeting. Three speakers outlined the co-ordinated review of four provincial conservation plans. Robert Pineo, for the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry's Niagara Escarpment Program; Judy Rhodes-Munk, planner with the Niagara Escarpment Commission; and Felix Whitton, from the Friends of the Greenbelt Foundation, shared the history and goals of these plans in the co-ordinated review now underway. Stage one of two periods of public consultation is drawing to a close.

Robert began with supplying background. The first Niagara Escarpment Plan was finalized in 1985. In 1997 Provincial Policy Statements contained reference to 'natural systems' and 'corridors'. The Oak Ridges Plan in 2002, was born of concern about urban sprawl, environmental degradation, and particularly, protection of water resources. In 2005 the Greenbelt Plan took in another million acres, focussed on Natural Heritage, Water Resources systems and agricultural protection in particular. A systems-based approach set in. In 2006 Places to Grow created the Growth Plan for the Greater Golden Horseshoe. It was about where and how to grow as opposed to previous plans which were about what to protect. The latter three plans are with the Ministry of Municipal Affairs and Housing. The original Greenbelt concept was larger and took in the whole of the peninsula; now our Greenbelt area closely follows the

Shared goals have brought about this co-ordinated review; they include: protecting our finite resources of agricultural land, water, natural areas and wetlands; aligning land use planning and infrastructure, including transit; fostering healthy, complete communities that can reduce healthcare costs and attract workers and employers; building resilient communities in the face of climate change and improving alignment between the plans and efficient implementation. An Advisory Panel chaired by David Crombie is developing recommendations on how to improve the plans and will deliver its report to the Ministers by Sept. 2015

Lands that are protected sell at a fraction of the return realized from lands outside protected areas (a tenth in the case of farmland). Hence the comment that greenbelts take good care of farms, but not farmers. The David Suzuki Foundation estimates the value of services provided by the protected environment at 2.6 billion dollars a year, beginning with air and water cleansing. Municipalities, landowners, stakeholders, Aboriginal communities

are among those offering input. The second stage of public consultation will be looking for feedback on amendments.

Judy spoke of the commission's response to twenty-one topics in the review, including additions to the plan (natural geophysical features, like islands), interests of endangered species. and small scale uses, such as B&Bs.

bring together those

affected by the plans. The Greenbelt and our Biosphere Association share similar visions - balancing agricultural, economic and environmental interests - (the two have worked together for the past three years and our conservation and stewardship program received a Greenbelt grant). The Friends support 104 farmers' markets and have undertaken a pilot project on farm energy-efficient technologies with impressive results. Special areas of interest include the Holland Marsh and the Niagara fruit and wine producing regions. Challenges arise when habitat crosses farmland and linkages range outside the belt or transit infrastructure risks fragmenting the land base and contributing to climate change. Funded mainly by the province, the Friends foundation consults with stakeholders. There's a need for monitoring effectiveness, reducing 'red tape', mapping and defining regional agricultural systems (neighbours with gm crops, windmills, hog barns...) for protecting 'external connections', growing the Greenbelt to include urban river valleys and for provincial funding commitment. The region's Greenbelt, containing almost two million acres, is the largest and most strongly protected greenbelt in the world.

BPEG's next meeting will be on Wednesday, August 5th, 7:30 p.m. at the Christ Church Parish Hall. Stephen Scharper will be sharing the film Journey of the Universe.

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Mr. Jakob Van Dorp introduced Mr. Brian McHattie, Planner for Bruce County Planning Department.

Mr. Jakob Van Dorp, Bruce County Planner, reviewed the report. Mr. Van Dorp stated that the purpose of the application is to amend Comprehensive Zoning By-law No. 2002-54, as amended, for the lands described as Plan M-10 Block A Sec M 10 PCL 1-A2 (Eastnor), the amendment proposes to rezone approximately 4149 square metres from "EH Environmental Hazard" and "R2 Resort Residential" to R2-XX-2015 Resort Residential Special to deal with hazard, lot area and frontage.

Mr. Van Dorp outlined the nature and intent of the application, providing the location, description, servicing and compliance with the Zoning By-law and the Local Official Plan. He advised that no objections have been received from the agency circulation. The Grey Sauble Conservation Authority (GSCA) identified that the 177.6m elevation to be located on the water side of the road and areas of potential flooding include the road allowance. The GSCA identified wooded areas with vegetation and pockets of wetland vegetation. The GSCA recommended that consolidation of

the three (3) lots to yield two (2) lots would protect the majority of the natural areas on site. The GSCA noted that proposed natural hazard zoning covers wetland areas which can function as significant wildlife habitat. The GSCA recommended that an Environmental Impact Study is not required to address Eastern Massassauga rattlesnake habitat for development associated with a two-lot configuration. Municipal Staff have provided comments that were approved by Council Resolution No. 13-04-2015:

- 1. THAT a surveyor's drawing be completed and a copy filed with the Municipal Clerk, the Registrar and two copies filed with the Approval Authority for the County of Bruce or an exemption from the survey be received.
- 2. THAT the Municipality provide written confirmation to the Approval Authority that the Municipal conditions as imposed herein have been fulfilled.
- 3. THAT the Clerk of the Municipality provides written confirmation to the Approval Authority that the zoning amendment by-law is in force and effect pursuant to the provisions of the Planning

Act, 1990, as amended.

- 4. THAT the owners shall provide a drainage plan of the subject lands for approval by the Public Works Department.
- 5. THAT only one 911 civic address will be assigned to the lands (shown in green) which property will be numbered on Hardwick Cove Road.
- 6. THAT, pursuant to Section 53(42) of the Planning Act, the Certificate of Consent be affixed to the deed within one year of the giving of the Notice of Decision. Note that Section 53(43) of the Planning Act requires that the transaction approved by this consent must be carried out within two years of the issuance of the certificate (ie. stamping of the deed).
- 7. THAT the applicant pays a \$130.00 fee at the time of certification of the deeds.

Staff noted that there is an existing septic system, which is on a piece of land that is proposed to be severed from the existing cottage dwelling and added to the adjacent vacant lot. In order to avoid running afoul of Building Code and Ministry of the Environment requirements regarding locations of the system on the same property as the use that it serves, Municipal Staff recommend an additional condition of consent being:

THAT the Municipality's Septic System Inspector provide written confirmation that:

1) THAT The owners have applied for and received a permit to install a septic system in conformity with the Ontario Building Code on the lands currently described as "Con 3 WBR Part Lot 34, RP 3R3233; Part 4" and having Roll No. 41 09 620 005 04200.

2) THAT the septic system referred to in (i) has been installed within the lands that are proposed to be added to the existing lot at 149 Hardwick Cove Road, but not connected to any dwelling;

3) THAT the septic system on the property described as "Town Plot of Hardwick Part Lot F; RP 3R3233 Parts 1, 2 and 3" and having the Roll No. 41 09 620 005 20000 has been disconnected from the existing dwelling on the same property; and

4) THAT the owners have supplied a statement of contract with a licensed septic system installer to connect the septic system referred to in (i) and (ii) to the cottage at 149 Hardwick Cove Road upon registration of the certified consent with the Land Registry Office of the County of Bruce

Correspondence was received from the public, two (2) which were in support, one requiring information and one which was opposed to the zoning amendment with concerns for precedent and protection

of unique vegetation, fish habitat on the shoreline and disruption of the natural balance and requested consideration of Bruce Peninsula as a UNESCO World Biosphere that should continue to be protected. The Planning Department responded that the application has been accompanied by a topographic survey which identified that the area of environmental hazards to buildings and structures is less extensive than had been previously indicated and the proposal involves reconfiguring lots and yields a net reduction in the number of lots which could be developed.

In closing, Mr. Van Dorp stated that the Bruce County Planning Department is recommending approval of the Zoning By-law amendment.

Mr. Jakob Van Dorp, Bruce County Planner, reviewed the report. Mr. Van Dorp stated that the purpose of the application is to amend Comprehensive Zoning Bylaw No. 2002-54, as amended, for the lands described as Part Lot 13 Concession 2 WBR (Eastnor), the amendment is proposing to rezone the retained lands to permit the minimum lot area (for the large parcel) to be reduced from 39 hectares to 37 hectares.

Mr. Van Dorp outlined the nature and intent of the application, providing the location, description, servicing and compliance with the Zoning By-law and the Bruce County Official Plan. He advised that no objections have been received from the agency circulation. The Grey Sauble Conservation Authority (GSCA) identified a natural hazard area along the frontage of the proposed retained lot, as well as an area mapped deer yard by the Ministry of Natural Resources, potential for significant

woodlands, and species at risk. The GSCA also provided updated hazard mapping which is incorporated in the draft by law schedule. The Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) could not evaluate the significance of the woodland area without an Environmental Impact Study. The MNR suggested the best approach could include a footprint along the edge of the woodland habitat rather than in the middle of the property to reduce disturbance to interior habitat or setting a smaller development footprint will also lessen the impacts overall to the woodlands. The MNR indicated that a deer yard exists on the property, but that the Consent/Zoning By-law Amendment will not have a measurable impact to the function and process of the deer yard. The potential for impact from the proposed activity on an identified endangered species in the area is low. The best management practices should be used to avoid potential impacts to other species at risk such as clearing trees and vegetation outside the breeding bird window (mid-May to mid-July) and locating the building envelope away from areas of exposed limestone bedrock with deep fissures. The building should be large enough to facilitate the siting of building away from the wildland fire hazards. Municipal Staff have provided comments on the proposed conditions of consent.

There was no correspondence from the public in respect of the application.

In closing, Mr. Van Dorp stated that the Bruce County Planning Department is recommending approval of the Zoning By-law amendment.

Fire Chief Wilf Barnes would like to inform residents and businesses that Flying Lanterns are not permitted within the Municipality of Northern Bruce Peninsula. These products resemble a small paper hot-air balloon, fuelled by an open flame. When released, the hot air produced by the fuel source can lift the lantern to extreme heights and allows it to drift for long distances until the fuel is depleted. These lanterns are often released in large numbers to generate an impressive visual effect. Due to their uncontrolled and unpredictable flight path, these products could land on trees, building rooftops, or other combustible properties while still ignited and cause fires.

## In The Garden: Hints From A Mrs Gardener -The Cottage Garden (Not To Be Confused With "Cottage Gardening")

A cottage garden is a look, its a garden that has lots of colour, from early spring when the daffodils and tulips emerge till the last hurrah in the fall.

It has a relaxed fun look to it, nothing formal about a "cottage garden". It's an anything goes type of willy nilly garden. It's a garden that if your Whorled Loosestrife wanted to wiggle its way through, you let it. If your Rose Campion decides to throw her seed all around you tell her to "go for it".

A cottage garden is a garden that you can let cover your entire tile bed, just let her go do her thing. Wild and crazy. Some plants to try in this type of garden are Iris, early yellow Lilies and my favorite early summer flowers, Lupinus. Love these when they seed out with all their colours mingling around the other flowers that are getting ready to make their appearance. Some of these could well be Coreopsis, Black Eyed Susans, Cranesbill, Shasta Daisy, Tiger Lilies, Rose Mallow, Monks Hood, Peach Leaf Bell flower and even Snap Dragons will seed out and give you a good show for the following year. Of course don't forget Fall Asters and Phlox for the fall and a tall grass to add winter interest.

We did a garden a few years ago for a friend who had a fairly big hill behind her house with only a couple of Peonies and tons of Hollyhocks and not much else. After we got it weeded we put in a winding path and started to plant. In went tough, easy to grow plants (all perennials) and a couple of flowering shrubs at the top of the hill just for privacy (it backed on to a busy street). In just two short years it was a mass of colour and the Hollyhocks spread out and another Peony appeared out of nowhere. It was even a much deeper pink (go figure).

Of course with any garden soil is the first and most important thing to deal with. Start with a good quality top soil adding mulch (at least a year old) and some compost.

The trend up here is to build a garden on your tile bed, but there is one thing (no two things) to remember: do not over-water and make sure everything you plant has shallow roots.

Two of my friends have gardens on their tile beds. One is an established garden like I have never seen before and the other just a year old and it promises to

Submitted by Joni Regan be a work of art. It is gorgeous even after only one year. Both full sun (I so envy them). A perfect place to put a garden and bonus - no grass to cut.

> Remember on a tile bed, nothing heavy, no deep roots and no trees, or even shrubs.

> If you're just starting out putting in gardens - start small (I should listen to myself). When you start small you can add two or put in several smaller ones that can be joined together by beautiful winding paths. Much easier than putting in big, then having to dig through them later to put in much needed paths.

> Oh well, it kept me busy for a few years. So now I'm going out to play in my garden. It is cooler, no humidity and it is calling me, no now it is yelling "get out here woman".
