PUBLISHER'S COLUMN

High and Low Water Levels – You Ain't Seen Nothing Yet (Maybe)

Our municipality's Comprehensive Zoning Bylaw regulates where buildings can be put. One of the most complex and important elements of that is establishing storm lines along our lakeshores, especially the shores of Lake Huron and Georgian Bay.

Lakes Huron and Michigan plus Georgian Bay and the North Channel are all one big waterbody — the largest freshwater "lake" in the world. The water level on that huge waterbody fluctuates. A lot. More than any of the other Great Lakes.

Various stakeholders and lobby groups insist that there should be active management of Lakes Michigan/Huron. The St Mary's River is regulated to keep the water level in Lake Superior within fairly tight limits. The outflow from Lake Ontario, likewise. The outflow from Lake Erie is regulated by a rock weir above the falls. But the St Clair and Detroit Rivers are left to their own devices except when the shipping channels need dredging. The St Clair isn't even monitored comprehensively, so nobody's really sure whether the flow is increasing, decreasing or staying the same although the International Joint Commission acknowledges that dredging, gravel mining and erosion of the St Clair River bottom have reduced Michigan/Huron levels by about 50cm.

Lake Michigan/Huron stakeholders, including Georgian Bay Great Lakes Foundation, suggest that — at the very least — there should be flow controls on the St Clair River to mitigate extreme low water events and that outflow from Lake Superior should be managed more equitably during high-water times, to mitigate high water events.

in Lake Huron/Georgian Bay rose from 175.57m in January of 2013 to 177.4m in July of 2020 — that's a difference of 1.83m or six feet. At the lowest water level, many shallow bays were dry and the Chi-Cheemaun ferry dock had to be modified so the vessel's rub rail wouldn't catch under the mooring fenders. In 2020, the water was so high that storms washed out Cabot Head Road, destroyed Lion's Head lighthouse and flooded many shoreline properties.

But if GBGLF's engineers are right (and they have a pretty good track record), there is much worse to come.

Their modelling — which incorporates cyclic phenomena like the El Niño/La Niña cycle, the NAO cycle (~30 years) and the various solar sun-spot cycles (all of which combine to explain most of the variation over the last 200 years) plus projections for global warming — suggests that the amplitude of fluctuations will probably increase in coming decades. They predict that in the next ten to twenty years, low water levels may drop a metre below previous recorded minima. In the decades after that, they expect levels to occasionally reach half a metre above previously recorded highs. (They are not modelling seiche events but rather normal "monthly averages". Seiches would be on top of that...)

Here is an excerpt from our current Comprehensive Zoning Bylaw (in place since 2002):

"In any zone, no building openings associated with the habitable floor area of a dwelling or structure shall be located at or below the minimum elevation of 179.1 m G.S.C. (587.5 ft) for lands adjacent to Lake Huron and 178 m G.S.C. (583.9 ft) for lands adjacent to Georgian Bay.

or;

In any zone on lands adjacent to Georgian

Bay or Lake Huron, all habitable buildings shall be setback a minimum of 15 m (49 ft) measured horizontally from the 177.6 G.S.C. (582.6ft) elevation."

On flat Lake Huron shorelines, that 15m horizontal setback from 177.6m got to feel pretty inadequate in 1986 and 2020 when the water levels got up above 177.4m. Just imagine how they'll feel when the water gets up above 178.0m.

And the doors and floors minimum of 178.0 for Georgian Bay may well be awash now and again after 2040.

Just to clarify: if GBGLF's engineers are right, these levels — highs above 178.0 and lows below 174.8 — will fall within the "normal" 30-year range of variation. And that's if sensible climate-change mitigation strategies are adopted.

If no such strategies are adopted, it will be much worse. The engineers suggest that water levels might occasionally rise as high as 179.6m by the end of the century. That would be devastating for most Lake Huron shoreline cottages. (That's almost 2m above current levels...)

It is ironic that the 2017-18 replacement for the CZB was not adopted because a lot of people felt the shoreline building limits were too restrictive.

Based on things that were said at the CZB Public Meetings in 2017, a lot of people seemed to think that as long as they followed municipal regulations, the municipality guaranteed their property would not be flooded. Those people are probably in for the roughest of surprises. The CZB is based on the best guesses, with no guarantees of accuracy.

But going forward, it poses a very interesting question. Should municipal zoning prepare for unprecedented events, based on credible science? Or stay with traditional regulations which are based on past patterns? Should a municipality guess as to what level of climate change mitigation is likely to be implemented? (Because those efforts could have huge effects on water levels...)

If the future is going to be different than the past, should municipal zoning anticipate that change? (And if not now — when?)

No public comments were received.

Mayor McIver closed this portion of the public meeting.

Delegation

Traci Smith, BDO LLP

Re: Audit Final Report to Council

BDO LLP Incorporated Partner, Traci Smith appeared via Zoom to present the 2021 Final Audit Report to members of Council.

Traci Smith provided a brief overview of the Executive Summary contained within the 2021 Final Audit Report. It was noted that all draft financial statements were approved by Council prior to being submitted to BDO.

Following the overview of the Executive Summary, Traci Smith disclosed information pertaining to the Auditors Report. The following points were noted within the Auditors Report:

- As of December 31, 2021, the Municipality of Northern Bruce Peninsula had no significant capital commitments
- BDO LLP did not find any deficiencies in the design and implementation of the internal controls tested during the audit
- BDO LLP did not identify any unadjusted differences or disclosures omissions throughout the audit
- BDO LLP reported a very clean audit

A brief overview of the Statement of Financial Position was provided to Council. Discussion surrounding the following categories were noted:

- Reserves
- Accounts Payable
- Deferred Revenue
- Financial Assets and Non-Financial Assets
- Statement of Operations
- User Fees
- Donations
- Operating Expenses
- Annual Surplus

It was noted that the increase in net financial assets was attributed to capital

expenses utilizing less funds than budgeted, creating an operating surplus.

Terri Smith stated that the Municipality of Northern Bruce Peninsula is currently in a strong financial position.

It was noted that an operating surplus of \$447,000 was transferred to Capital Reserves in compliance with Operating By-law 2002-04.

At this time, Terri Smith, opened the floor to questions.

Councillor Myles inquired regarding the differences reserves and reserve funds. Traci Smith responded and indicated that there are no differences between reserves and discretionary reserve funds. However, discretionary reserve funds must be kept in a separate bank account from the reserves and are not shown on the Statement of Financial Position

Councillor Golden inquired with regards to the operation of school boards within the County of Bruce. It was noted that the Municipality of Northern Bruce Peninsula remits approximately \$10,000,000 in tax dollars, with approximately \$2,700,00 going to the school board and the remaining funds being remitted to Bruce County.

Traci Smith responded and stated that the remittance of \$10,000,000 in tax dollars is not shown as income on any of the financial statements and is not considered taxation revenue, as the amount is not utilized by the Municipality. She further noted that the amount remitted is a standard percentage for a Municipality of our size and population.

Councillor Golden congratulated the Treasury Department for their efforts throughout 2021.

Mayor McIver thanked Traci Smith for her delegation to Council and the entire staff that was involved with the audit process.

She further stated that the report includes new definitions for "Columbarium" and "Short Term Accommodation" and updated provisions for the following uses: "Private Guest Cabin"; "Tourism Cottage"; "Tents, Trailers and Recreational Vehicles"; "Farmers Market" and "Lighting".

The following comments were received by Council during the overview;

- Recommended to state that Boathouses may not be utilized within the Municipality as a secondary dwelling unit and that the structure may not accommodate any living space

- It was noted that any docks in physical contact with 15 square metres of Crown owned lands require a work permit from the Ministry of Northern Development, Mines, Natural Resources, and Forestry (MNR)

- It was noted that any properties within Fathom Five National Marine Park must receive a permit prior to the installation of a dock

- Recommended to require dock permits within the Municipality, to address issues of encroachment on shore road allowances and shoreline development

- Recommended to incorporate the proposed implementation of permit limits for food trucks and zoning/ facility requirements for the establishment of food trucks within Zoning By-law Housekeeping Amendments

- Recommended to reevaluate the permitted zones for shipping containers

- Recommended to review the proposed utilization, maximum permitted number, and proposed property size requirements for shipping containers

- It was noted that stacking shipping containers will not be permitted

- It was noted that the zoning for Additional Dwelling Units should be revised

- Recommended to review the locational requirements within Agricultural and Rural zones in consideration of the Official Plan Amendments

- It was noted that Tiny Homes should comply with zoning provisions for Additional Dwelling Units.

- Recommended to solely permit a water closet and a sink within Private Guest Cabins

- Revisions required regarding the number of Tourist Cottage Rental buildings permitted per establishment in consideration with acreage

- Recommended to include provisions on the location of tents, trailers and recreational vehicles

- It was noted that Farmers Market booths are not permitted within 3 metres of any lot line

Ms. Scott will consider today's comments from Council and incorporate them into the report that will be presented at the June 13, 2022 Council meeting.

Reporter's Notebook: Wild Variations in Water Levels Predicted for Huron/Michigan/Georgian Bay

Booth at the Community Centre is traditionally the busiest such facility in Grey Bruce (by a wide margin) but there were still a lot of visitors wandering around in need of help.

The last few years, the chamber has staffed an information table at the head of Little Tub Harbour on busy days to see if this would help. The experiment was extremely successful at reaching a lot of people, but a table is not practical on windy or rainy days. So in cooperation with the municipality, the chamber installed a small (portable with a forklift) building just off the south corner of the harbour, not far from the new public washrooms. Built to look like a fisherman's shed, the new booth offers two service windows and a door than can stay open for ventilation purposes. The Chamber will staff the

"information shed" seven days a week from nine to five until at least Labour Day.

river (further erosion of the bottom made it worse) and nothing was done (or even seriously contemplated) to limit that flow.

Wild Water Level Variations

The Georgian Bay Great Lakes Foundation is a charitable organization dedicated to studying and predicting environmental changes around the Great Lakes, particularly Lake Huron and Georgian Bay. The organization (and its predecessor Georgian Bay Forever) have been studying and lobbying for decades. Their traditional focus has been on trying to persuade American and Canadian governments to mitigate the extreme water level variations that Lake Huron/Michigan and Georgian Bay are prone to.

They pointed out (loudly and often) that when water levels were extremely low (2000 to 2013), no attempts were being made to limit (or even monitor competently) the outflow of water through the St Clair River. The dredged shipping channel considerably increased the conveyance (flow capacity) of the

When increased precipitation in the late 2010s drove water levels up rapidly throughout the upper lakes, GBGLF pointed out that Lake Superior's water levels were carefully kept within prescribed limits and all the excess water was dumped through the St Mary's River into Lake Huron.

Government inaction, GBGLF insisted, caused both the high and the low water levels to be worse than they needed to be.

Environment Canada Climate Change recently released a slew of data and predictions about the next 80 years. GBGLF hired hydraulic control engineers Bill Bialkowski and Rob Nairn to explore and evaluate the information from ECCC on climate change water level predictions. Their findings were released in a webinar GBGLF held in May.

They pointed out (loudly and often) that when water levels were extremely low (2000 to 2013), no attempts were being made to limit (or even monitor competently) the outflow of water through the St Clair River.

Local Dog Dies After Contact With Rare Fungus

Tobermory dog owner Cheri Janknegt is hoping to spread awareness about a very rare fungus that recently killed her 6-year-old french bulldog Harlem. The dog was in contact with the Blastomycosis fungus somewhere in the Tobermory area.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) website states:

"Blastomycosis is an infection caused by a fungus called Blastomyces. The fungus lives in the environment, particularly in moist soil and in decomposing matter such as wood and leaves."

The University of Guelph's Animal Health Laboratory website states:

"Blastomycosis is a systemic mycotic infection caused by the dimorphic fungus Blastomyces dermatitidis. This organism grows in acidic soil in proximity to water and within decaying organic matter..., producing infective spores."

Blastomycosis is primarily a disease of North America, and is considered endemic to the Mississippi, Missouri, and Ohio River valleys, the Mid-Atlantic States, Manitoba, Ontario, Quebec, and southern Saskatchewan.

Most cases of blastomycosis are acquired by inhalation of spores. The spores enter the terminal airway and establish a primary infection in the lungs. Clinical signs of blastomycosis in dogs can include, but are not restricted to, anorexia, weight loss, cough, dyspnea, ocular disease, lameness, pyrexia, and skin lesions. These signs may have been apparent for days to weeks (occasionally longer) and are of varying severity.

Harlem's symptoms started out as a small cough. After initially suspecting it was "kennel cough" and a trip to the Southampton Vet Clinic, Harlem was then transferred to the Ontario Vet College in Guelph, ON where Janknegt made the difficult decision to euthanize the family pet instead of letting him endure the months of medication and treatment she was told were necessary.

Janknegt hopes other pet owners can use this information to make informed decisions if they suspect their pet may have been in contact with the fungal spores.

wetlands and invasive species: www.georgianbaygreatlakesfoundation.com

The Water Levels webinar is nearly an hour long but well worth the time. The last ten minutes are particularly compelling as Rob Nairn explores the

various overlapping cycles that affect Great Lakes water levels and ties them to observed fluctuations since 1819.

Some highlights:

- Climate change will cause water levels to fluctuate more wildly than ever before.
- By 2030, water levels are expected to dip well below historic low-water records.

• By 2050, water levels are expected to rise somewhat but to fluctuate about 3m within any given 5-year period — from about a metre below historic lows to at least half a metre above historic highs.

• If nothing is done to reduce greenhouse gases, water level fluctuations will be even worse.

MUNICIPAL ACCOMMODATION TAX (MAT) EFFECTIVE AS OF JANUARY 1, 2022

On Monday, September 27, 2021, Council passed By-law 2021-83, being a by-law to implement the Municipal Accommodation Tax on January 1, 2022. The implementation of a four percent (4%) mandatory MAT is applicable on all short-term accommodations under 30 days. As per Council discussion, commercial establishments such as Hotels, Trailer Parks, Hostels and Bed and Breakfasts will be exempt from this by-law.

A Provider shall remit to the Municipality for the MAT collected for the previous quarter and submit statements in the form required by the Municipality for the purpose of administering and enforcing this By-law. These remittances shall be made by the end of April, July, October, and January for the respective previous quarter.

In addition, the Municipal Accommodation Tax (MAT) came into effect as of April 2022. The April, May, and June remittance of the MAT is due July 31, 2022. The implementation of a four percent (4%) mandatory MAT is applicable on all short-term accommodation properties (rentals less than 30 days).

All firework displays, whether Family Fireworks or Display Fireworks, requires a permit prior to fireworks show. Permit applications need to be received by the Fire Chief 30 days prior to the fireworks show. The sale of fireworks is also prohibited by By-law No. 2022-21.

The sale of Family Fireworks and Display Fireworks is prohibited. Although the sale of fireworks is prohibited, Northern Bruce Peninsula will continue to work with business owners this year, to ensure continuing education about these new changes to the selling and possession of fireworks.

Major Waterfront Improvements Planned For Wiarton

Warton Ontario: South Bruce Peninsula council has authorized Canada's Department of Fisheries and Oceans to go ahead with major town dock and launch ramp repairs. It also approved significant improvements to Wiarton's waterfront jewel, Bluewater Park. The estimated \$800,000 worth of work will be completed by year's end. Most of the costs will be covered by federal grants.

The town and the Federal Department of Fisheries and Oceans agreed to the breakwater/town pier and launch ramp repairs as the facilities were considered to be unstable. The dock/breakwater has been closed to foot traffic for two years. They were damaged by wave action resulting from record breaking high lake levels the waves "severely undermining the breakwall and ramp sides."

It's not all good news.

The downside is that the Bluewater Park launch ramp, which sees thousands of launches a year, will be closed during the estimated two months of repairs. The ramp shutdown, possibly starting in July, is expected to take place during the Chantry Chinook Classic Derby July 23rd to August 7th and the Owen Sound Salmon

Spectacular August 26 to September 4. The Wiarton ramp experiences heavy use all summer and is especially busy during those derbies.

South Bruce Peninsula Director of public works Lara Widdifield reported to council, "the launch ramp will not be able to remain in service during the dock construction due to safety concerns based on its proximity to the breakwater..."

we must maintain safe separation between the public and the construction zone... it would be ideal to undertake the work in the fall minimizing the impact on boaters but there are conflicts reflecting the fall fish spawning season... the water near the dock is considered prime coldwater fish spawning habitat."

The Public Works chief continued, "if the work were deferred to begin in September or October delays would jeopardize the funding for the project... the project must be completed by December 31st under the terms of the grant."

Councillors responding to questions from a two person delegation from the 200-member Bruce Peninsula Sportsmen's

Association (BPSA) promised to hunt for alternate temporary launch locations during the ramp shutdown. BPSA members Kevin Harders and Mike Smith suggested allowing the ramps to remain open on weekends if construction halted at that time. Council pledged to try to "minimize the impact on boaters by possibly setting up a temporary launch location, or working with the Wiarton Marina or nearby Georgian Bluffs to create temporary ramps to handle the overflow from Wiarton."

South Bruce Peninsula Mayor Janice Jackson told me, "We will try to limit the impact on ramp users as much as possible. We know anglers and boaters spend big money here." The Mayor continued, "We are thrilled that this Bluewater Park revitalization is going ahead including a new bandshell, the pier causeway repairs, washroom upgrades, and new interpretive plaques along the waterfront trail, new pathway lighting and a big illuminated Wiarton sign similar to the sign at Toronto's City Hall. The infrastructure upgrades will allow for increased tourism which leads to increased visitor spending."

She concluded, "With the temporary ramp shutdown and other repairs, it appears it will be short term pain for long term gain."

Memorial Scattering Garden in Lion's Head to Hold Open House in August

The Memorial Scattering Garden was created as a sanctuary, a sacred place, a quiet haven of rest, reflection and prayer. The Garden is situated behind Christ Church, 55 Main Street, Lion's Head. In September 2008, consent was given by the Ontario Government for it to operate as a licensed place for the scattering of ashes under the Bereavement Act of Ontario.

With four years of volunteer effort creating a garden, the Memorial Scattering

Garden became a reality and is open to all. "This is the Lord's garden. All are welcome here," reads the sign at the entry to the Garden.

Christ Church's Annual Report says, "Our ministry is not only for those who profess the Christian faith: we care for the souls and ashes of any in our community and beyond, who request that their ashes or a loved one's, rest in this Garden until the end of time."

"The sad reality is that too often, bereaved families are left with an urn of ashes without any plans for them. Too often, funeral directors and crematoriums have to deal with unclaimed ashes. Christ Church wants community members to know about the Memorial Scattering Garden where they can bring the ashes of their loved ones - to a Garden tended with loving care," said Alison Knight, churchwarden and trustee of the Garden.

The process for scattering ashes is a simple one. First, contact Christ Church, Lion's Head (ph: 519 793-3784 or email: christchurch lionshead@diohuron.org). The Church will set a mutually agreed date and assist in organizing the scattering, including help with arrangements for clergy if needed. There is a simple contract to sign.

The cost is \$250, of which \$150 goes to the Perpetual Care Fund to take care of the Garden in perpetuity. While the other \$100 goes to upkeep of the Garden such as gardening, fence repairs, etc.

Each person whose ashes are scattered in the Garden has an engraved plaque with his or her name. The plaque is affixed to the stone plinth located within

the Garden. Also, there is a recording of the scattering in the Register kept in the Church office.

The Board of the Memorial Scattering Garden looks forward to sharing their vision with all the members of the community and welcomes interested persons to visit the Garden at their leisure and/or attend their Open House in August to find out more about the Garden.

Elusive Takes 1st in 11th Annual Isthmus Bay Sailboat Races
