using the electronic method, however, it's encouraging to see the younger generation is showing a large percentage of eligible voters exercising their right to vote.

The total number of people who voted using the internet was 88% compared to 12% who used the telephone method of voting.

Voter participation throughout some other Bruce County municipalities was as follows:

- Brockton – 35.4%
- Arran-Elderslie – 46.6%
- Kincardine – 45.1%
- Town of South Bruce Pen – 42.5%
- Municipality of South Bruce – 59.3%
- Township of Huron-Kinloss – 40.9%

CUPE Strike Only Affects School Custodians

As this newspaper goes to press, the Canadian Union of Public Employees

(CUPE) strike against the Government of Ontario is in its second day.

CUPE represents a broad spectrum of educational and support workers in Ontario, but precisely which staff members belong to CUPE varies from board to board. In Bluewater District School Board (BWDSB), only custodial and maintenance staff are CUPE members, so they are the only ones on strike. In our community, that means one custodian in each of our schools.

On the first day of the strike, picketers concentrated on the office of MPP Rick Byers, so there were no picket lines at individual schools.

As of the evening of November 6, BWDSB is saying that Bluewater schools will be open on November 7. School buses will run their normal routes but all extra-curricular activities are cancelled.

BWDSB warns that "Families should be aware that school closures may become necessary if the withdrawal of services by CUPE members continues beyond this point". Up-to-date information can be found on the board website: www.bwdsb.on.ca; select Labour Updates in the SPOTLIGHT menu along the right border.

Sharp Slowdown in Real Estate

The Realtors Association of Grey Bruce Owen Sound offers some numbers on the current real estate market. Home sales in October were more than 40% below the 5- and 10-year averages for October. The number of active listings is more than double the number from this date last year. The "Residential Average Price" was barely \$600,000 for October; it was

above \$750,000 from December 2021 to March 2022.

New Minister at Tobermory United Church

Tobermory United Church has been without a minister since the departure of Brad Inglis last year.

The church has now hired a new minister, Rev Sheryl Spencer. Her first service will be November 20.

from Ethel and Bill Haythorne. The original store had been operating at 9 Bay Street since the 1960's and officially became a Foodland store in the year 2000. The Peacock family has expanded the store over the years to 6,500 square feet, providing local shoppers and tourists with an impressive variety of products. After working in the store as a teenager, Rick Peacock Jr., joined his father, Owner Rick Peacock Sr. around 2004 to become an integral part of the family business.

Although the harbour is a beautiful

location, further expansion required more land for a larger store and more room for parking. Rick Peacock and Manager Carrie Bennett have enjoyed their time at the Bay Street location. 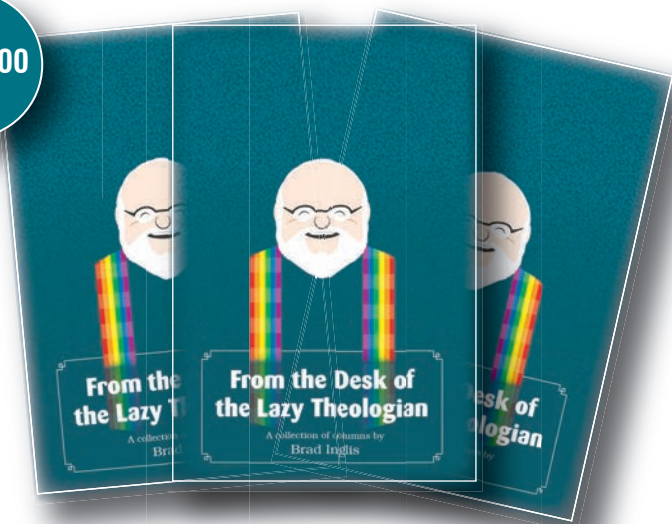

PUBLISHER'S COLUMN

Building a Stroller's Paradise Begins With Paths and the Minch Anchor Belvedere

For the record, I think the locations most urgently in need of paths are:

- 1) Bay St N, from the Princess to Earl St
- 2) Harpur Drive and Earl St
- 3) Big Tub Road
- 4) Legion St
- 5) Brock St/Nicholas St

But that got me thinking about what a walkable/cycleable community would look like, both from a tourist's point of view and a resident's point of view.

Which got me to thinking about the most walkable/cycleable destinations I've been to: Cinque Terra, Florence and Venice, Italy; Tavira, Portugal; Seville, Spain; Sanibel Island, Florida; Mackinac Island, Michigan. These leap to mind, but

there are many others. (Very few of them in Canada, by the way, other than Lion's Head.)

What do these places have in common? A whole bunch of things to do and things to look at, close enough together that you can just walk (or cycle) from one to the next. It makes walking/strolling/cycling a pleasure.

Venice is probably the best example — there are no wheeled vehicles at all and nobody misses them. Strolling about is what you go to Venice for.

Lion's Head is one of those perfect places. With a kilometre or so of public shoreline, including a gorgeous sand beach; with Bruce Trail segments heading north and south and the Lookout trail going east; with a tight downtown core offering restaurants, a pub and a full range of retail. All within fifteen minutes on foot or five minutes on a bike. What more could a resident (or a visitor) ask?

Tobermory is a very different scenario. It has much less public shoreline and almost no attractive public shoreline.

The east side of the harbour is mostly low cliffs or rough rocks. The ferry dock is, well, butt ugly. A monstrosity of pavement and concrete where the village's business core used to be. The Government of Ontario expropriated the guts of Tobermory's commercial sector to put in that parking lot. Was there room elsewhere? Yep. There still is. They could easily re-jigger the ferry dock to free up a couple of hundred feet of shoreline. But I digress...

The east side of Tobermory Harbour offers a wonderful view, or at least it would if there was a comfortable place to stand and the view wasn't blocked by trees and scrub.

Europe figured this out centuries ago. They built belvederes. (Wikipedia tells us that the word is derived from the Italian for "beautiful view"; "...an architectural structure sited to take advantage of a fine or scenic view".

Tobermory and Northern Bruce Peninsula Chamber of Commerce is proposing a viewing deck on the south

side of Little Tub Harbour by the Minch anchor. This is a brilliant idea and I encourage our new Council to jump on it with both feet — it's also an easy way to show people that we're doing something with their paid parking revenues.

But the Minch Belvedere (sounds better, doesn't it?) should not be a one-off. It should be the proof of concept, the prototype, the first of many.

Imagine another belvedere further down the harbour, just above the fisheries. A couple more north of the fisheries, including an expansion of the existing "Tugs" snorkel/dive platform.

And don't forget the "Gap". Wouldn't it be lovely to have a belvedere there? Back at the top of the low cliff, so it wouldn't interfere with people using the shoreline?

We could build all of those in the next ten years with paid parking revenues and have money left over when we're done.

And what a difference it would make to our community! With attractive places spread out around the village, it would become a place to just stroll around and soak up the ambience. The commercial sector would grow up around that new pattern of movement, which would make the village even more attractive.

One of the important things about strolling is that it's not weather-dependent. It's just as much fun on a mild day in November as on a hot day in August. We're already seeing a lot of visitors before Victoria Day and after Thanksgiving. Let's give them — and ourselves — a better village to stroll around.

And a hundred years from now, what will our villages look like? My guess is that there will be a lot of belvederes, a lot of places to experience the shoreline and look out over the water.

For a sneak preview of the possibilities, look at Tobermory online in Bruce County Map Factory. Look at the unopened road allowances. There's one at North Point, three along the shores of Big Tub Harbour. Plus Dunks Bay, of course. Tobermory could be a wonderful place to just stroll.

But it all starts with building the Minch Anchor Belvedere.

Bruce Peninsula O.P.P. Report: Driver Charged In Thanksgiving Weekend Crash

(NORTHERN BRUCE PENINSULA, ON) - An individual was charged in relation to a crash which took place on the Thanksgiving Day weekend.

On October 9, 2022, at 3:05 p.m., The Grey Bruce Ontario Provincial Police, along with Bruce County Paramedic Services and the Lions Head Fire Department responded to a report of a collision involving a motor vehicle and two pedestrians along Highway 6 in the Municipality of Northern Bruce Peninsula.

Two individuals were transported to a local hospital to be treated for serious non-life-threatening injuries.

The Grey Bruce OPP have charged a 43 year old from East York with dangerous operation causing bodily harm.

The accused was released and is scheduled to appear at the Ontario Court of Justice in Owen Sound at a later date.

POLICE WARN PEDESTRIANS, CYCLISTS, AND MOTORISTS TO STAY SAFE

Be Visible, Be Aware, and Be Safe

(LONDON, ON) - Members of the Ontario Provincial Police are urging pedestrians, cyclists, motorcyclists, and motorists alike to make safety a priority as we enter the winter season.

Since September, OPP West Region members have responded to four fatal collisions involving two pedestrians, a cyclist, and a motorcyclist, in which drivers reported they couldn't see the victim before the collision. As the season changes and night falls earlier, police are urging all road users to take some simple steps to ensure everyone gets where they're going safely.

Safety advice for pedestrians, cyclists, and motorcyclists:

-If you venture out after dark or in low-light conditions, you should remember the importance of being visible to traffic. Drivers cannot avoid what they cannot see.

-Pedestrians should wear bright or reflective clothing and carry a flashlight.

-It is safest to walk on sidewalks. Where there are no sidewalks, always walk on the shoulder of the road facing traffic.

-Cross at pedestrian crosswalks or crossovers. Don't cross in the middle of a block or between parked cars.

-Cross only when traffic has come to a full stop.

-Cyclists should have functioning lights and reflectors on their bicycles.

-Motorcyclists should ensure their lighting system is functional and fully engaged when dark or in low light.

-Watch for vehicles turning at intersections.

-Watch for vehicles entering or leaving driveways.

Safety advice for motorists:

-Motorists should always watch for pedestrians, especially during dark hours.

-Cut the distractions, look ahead, drive within the speed limit, and allow time to react to unexpected situations.

-Be extra careful when driving in a school zone

-Yield right-of-way. When a pedestrian is at a crossing, you must stop.

-Do not proceed until the crosswalk is clear of pedestrians.

Drivers and pedestrians share the responsibility for keeping our roads safe; please do your part.

Public Health Advises People To Stay Home When Sick

Media Release

November 4, 2022 – With viruses like COVID-19, influenza, and RSV co-circulating in Ontario this fall, the Grey Bruce Health Unit is reminding people that staying home when sick is key to slowing down community transmission of all infectious diseases.

“Regardless of what you are sick

with, you should stay home until you are fever-free and feeling better for 24 hours if you’re experiencing respiratory symptoms or for 48 hours if you have gastrointestinal symptoms,” says Dr. Rim Zayed, Physician Consultant at the Grey Bruce Health Unit.

Last week, Public Health advised residents to take measures to help slow

the spread of COVID-19 as all key local indicators – including the number of outbreaks in long-term care – suggest the rate of transmission of the virus is trending upward in the area.

The fall flu season is also in full swing in Grey-Bruce after getting off to an early start, with the first confirmed local case being reported in late September.

In the fall and winter, many respiratory viruses are likely circulating in the community. To prevent community transmission of infectious diseases, all individuals with new symptom(s) of any infectious illness should stay home when they’re feeling sick.

Climate Comment For October 2022

Sunny, Warm And Dry-Ish!

Well, drier than usual but not truly dry, as anyone driving on Highway 6 in the early hours of the 20th can testify. A combination of rain, sleet and snow down the highway made driving quite hazardous. While the temperature in Tobermory was 1.3C, it fell just below zero a few kilometres south and the nasty mix began to freeze on the road.

But we got it easy compared to Highway 17 between Sudbury and Bracebridge where there was a multi-car pileup owing to icy bridges and poor visibility. The Bracebridge area reported 10 cms. of snow and power outages.

Meanwhile we flirted with frost on several occasions but 1.3C was the lowest we reached on Big Tub Harbour. Our highest temperature was 20.1C on the 24th, unusually late in the month. The mean temperature for October was 9.3C, a third of a degree above normal. It was also the second sunniest October I have recorded. There were seventeen truly

sunny days, with the week of the 21st deserving the title of Second Summer. Every day that week was sunny with the mercury reaching the high teens.

Despite the precipitation I mentioned above, it was actually a fairly normal month at 78mm. Most fell on the 17th (26mm.) followed by the 12th (13mm). Southern Ontario generally was in the same ball park, but the North saw 15-20 cm. of snow despite periods of much warmer temperatures, particularly in the north-east. James Bay saw the mercury soar ten degrees above normal for several days in the middle of the month. As is becoming "normal", temperature differentials from historic levels are growing more rapidly the further north one goes.

November has started out where October left off. We still haven't had a full frost on Big Tub and the forecast suggests more sunny days and double-digit temperatures for the next week. Let's hope!

Bruce Peninsula National Park

Notice to hunters in the vicinity

Park boundaries

Bruce Peninsula National Park is located within Ontario's Wildlife Management Unit 83A. Hunting is prohibited in national parks. It is the responsibility of the hunter to be aware of his/her location when hunting near the park boundary. Contact park staff at bruce-fathomfive@pc.gc.ca for the most up-to-date boundary information. It is illegal to possess wildlife dead or alive in a national park.

Transportation of firearms in a national park

A Special Activity Permit is required to transport firearms across properties administered by Parks Canada. Firearms transported in or through a national park must be unloaded and encased at all times. Firearms and associated permits must be available for inspection on the request of a park warden.

Communications regarding location of wildlife

No person shall communicate by any means the location of wildlife within the park to any person within or outside the park if either person is hunting.

Wounded wildlife retrieval policy

Wildlife shot and wounded legally on provincial or private lands that subsequently run into Bruce Peninsula National Park must be reported to a park warden for assistance in tracking and retrieval by contacting our 24-hour dispatch service at 519-596-2702. Hunters who plan to transport wildlife through any part of Bruce Peninsula National Park must notify our 24-hour dispatch service prior to entering or exiting the park.

Il est interdit de communiquer, de quelque façon que ce soit, l'emplacement d'animaux sauvages dans le parc à quelqu'un qui se trouve à l'intérieur ou à l'extérieur du parc si l'une des personnes s'adonne à la chasse.

Politique de retrait des animaux sauvages blessés

Il arrive que des animaux sauvages blessés dans le cadre d'une chasse légale sur des terres provinciales ou privées se retrouvent dans le parc national de la Péninsule-Bruce. Si vous êtes témoin d'une telle situation, appelez le Service de répartition, ouvert 24 h, au 519-596-2702; on informera un garde de parc afin que celui-ci repère et retire l'animal. 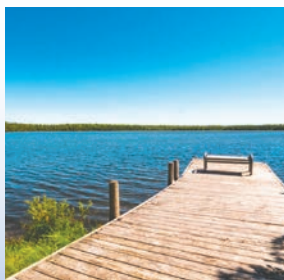

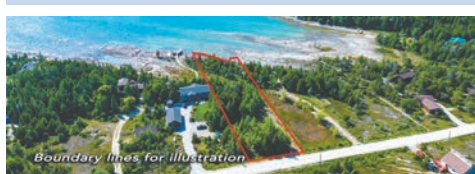
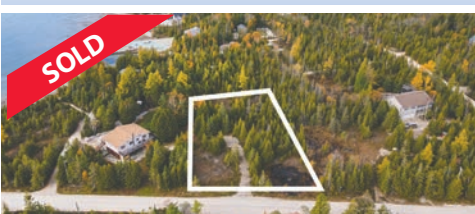

MUNICIPAL ACCOMMODATION TAX (MAT) EFFECTIVE AS OF JANUARY 1, 2022

On Monday, September 27, 2021, Council passed By-law 2021-83, being a by-law to implement the Municipal Accommodation Tax on January 1, 2022. The implementation of a four percent (4%) mandatory MAT is applicable on all short-term accommodations under 30 days.

A Provider shall remit to the Municipality for the MAT collected for the previous quarter and submit statements in the form required by the Municipality for the purpose of administering and enforcing this By-law. These remittances shall be made by the end of April, July, October, and January for the respective previous quarter.

In addition, the Municipal Accommodation Tax (MAT) came into effect as of April 2022. The July, August and September remittance of the MAT is due January 31, 2023. The implementation of a four percent (4%) mandatory MAT is applicable on all short-term accommodation properties (rentals less than 30 days).

How do I report and remit the Municipal Accommodation Tax that I collected?

The Municipality has partnered with a company called Harmari to collect the payments. Registered STA owners will receive a welcome email from Harmari that includes a Username and Password. There will be a link on the Municipal Website where you can access the reporting and payment. If you require assistance, please email cs@harmari.zendesk.com Please ensure you use the email that Harmari provided you to access the site.

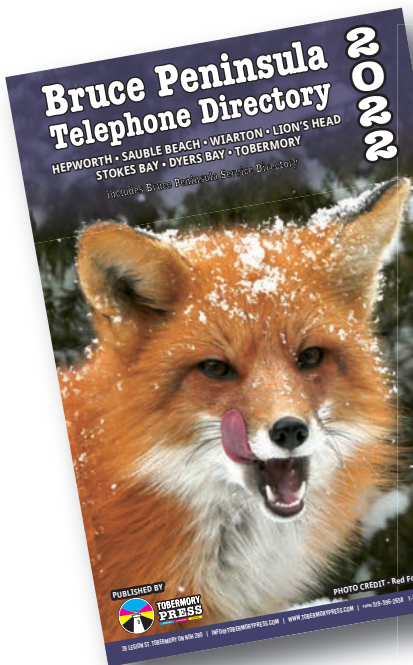
