Old Peacock's Foodland Demolished

MNBP Draft 2024 Budget Proposes 7.2% Mill-rate Increase

With four Council Meetings over a ten-day period, it's a very busy time of year for staff and council members at Northern Bruce Peninsula. In addition to the day-to-day business of the municipality, there is also a 2024 budget to create and an arena/ community centre to renovate.

A regular Council Meeting was held on January 8 as well as a Special Meeting to consider the 2024 capital budget. On January 15, a Special Meeting (cancelled due to weather and closure of Highway 6) was supposed to consider operating budgets and on January 17, a Special Meeting will address the budget for the renovation of the Lion's Head arena/community

The first draft of the 2024 budget was included in the Agenda for the January 8 Special Meeting. It proposes a 7.2% increase in the tax rate which, coupled with a 1.67% increase in the total assessed value of all properties, would generate a 9.11% increase in net tax

Climate Comment for December 2023 The Warmest On Record

Submitted by Bill Caulfeild-Browne 1923, 100 years ago, boasted the warmest December on record with a mean temperature of +0.8C, just above freezing. 1952 was the only other year in the past century that had a mean temperature exceeding zero degrees - it was +0.2C.

2023 knocked those records out of the ball park with a whopping mean of +2.0C, exactly five degrees above the long-term average. Further confirmation - if it's needed - that the winters are warming faster than the summers.

No wonder we didn't have a white Xmas - the 25th was the warmest day of the month at 10.4C. The coldest day was the 19th at -6.7C, roughly the same as the coldest day in November. On top of that, it was a dry month. My station recorded just 29mm of moisture, half the average of 60mm.

We were not alone. Nearly every location in Ontario from Windsor to was 10C above normal while Toronto was the same as us. However, areas south of us got much more precipitation. Areas like Welland and Kingston saw 20-40% more than average, while areas to the north like Sudbury saw only 25% of normal.

The year as a whole continued the warming of the post-industrial world. For Tobermory it was the second hottest (tied) year on record at a full 2.0C above normal, eclipsed only by 2012 which had an unusually warm summer.

As I write this on January 4th it looks as if real winter will be held at bay for a while yet. Last night did drop to -8C but the forecast continues to show highs around the freezing mark - most un-January like. This is bad news for humans who like to ski or snowmobile and for animals who should be hibernating. We had a black bear on our deck just last week, using up his fat reserves when he should be sleeping.

On that note I'll leave you with wishes Kapuskasing broke records - Thunder Bay for a more normal climate in 2024.

revenue to a total of \$8,399,770. (The total value of all property in MNBP is \$1,746,403,018, which is an increase of \$28,609,600 over the 2023 total.)

For residential properties, the 2024 mill rates will increase taxes by \$33.65 per \$100,000 of assessed property

The largest single component of our municipality's expenses is our 442 km of municipal roads, which normally consume more than half of the municipality's operations budget and, in the long term, more than half of the capital budget as well.

But this year is a bit different. More on that in a moment.

Road building and road maintenance materials have seen steep price increases over the last five years, especially the last three years. As Public Works Manager Troy Cameron told Council on January 8, surface treatment gravel took a huge jump in 2022 and another jump in 2023. He is anticipating a further 10-15% increase in 2024. According to the consultant study the municipality commissioned three years ago, we should be spending \$1.4 million per year to keep our paved roads from deteriorating further (and more than that if we want an improvement). What we have actually een spending is about \$1 million

per year. Maintaining our gravel roads adds another \$1.1 million per vear. What's worse, the consultant's projections are based on 2022/2023 prices so the actual costs will probably be higher.

In addition to maintenance, Public Works is projected to spend \$4.8 million in capital expenses this year — \$720,000 in equipment, \$3,015,295 in construction (roads, bridges, sidewalks) and \$1,085,000 in resurfacing.

\$1.64 million of Public Works' capital budget comes out of various municipal reserves; \$433,000 comes from federal and provincial grants. The rest comes out of this year's budget.

But far and away the biggest project this year is the renovation of the arena/community centre building in Lion's Head. The municipality had earmarked \$10 million for the project, more than a quarter of which is federal and provincial grants. But inflation has taken a large bite out of what \$10 million will buy.

Ball Construction, the firm MNBP hired to act as Construction Manager for the project, recently submitted an "order of magnitude budget" for each of the facilities MNBP would like to incorporate into the arena complex.

The total cost is \$16 million, not \$10 million. Council will have to decide whether to expand the budget or make drastic cuts to the facility.

Ball Construction's report to Council appears in the Agenda for the January 17 Special Meeting. It can be found online.

PUBLISHER'S COLUMN

As often happens to politicians, our municipal councillors are being given contradictory instructions by different groups of MNBP citizens.

Loud instructions.

As Mayor Milt McIver often reminds us, a lot of voters tell him that "tourism should pay for tourism".

With commercial tourism properties constituting less than 2% of the municipality's tax base, there's no way to cover those expenses out of the tourism sector's municipal taxes.

So other strategies are needed.

Paid parking was MNBP's first foray into trying to get tourism to pay for tourism. It has been quite successful but it barely scratches the surface of what all those visitors actually cost us.

Tourism costs us somewhere over a million dollars a year, although you have to squint to see it.

Take Bylaw Enforcement, for example. It has an operations budget of \$632,000

for 2024 (not including capital items). But that's not all for tourism, is it?

Well... think back to 25 years ago. Bylaw enforcement used to be something the building inspector did in his spare time. Now Bylaw Enforcement is its own department with a much higher budget than Building Inspection.

What changed? Tourism.

You can see the same pattern with our Fire and Emergency Services department. A large number of their calls to service are for people lost in the woods, people lost in the water, people who've fallen off cliffs or people who have built illegal

If you squint a little harder, you can see the same pattern in our Roads budget, our garbage and landfill budgets, our OPP budget and so on.

Crowds of tourists add cost to almost every budget. Most owners of residential and farm properties resent paying those costs, resent paying higher taxes without a corresponding increase in the services they care about.

Letter: Is Basic Housing a Right or a Privilege?

From Wiarton to Sauble Beach, Howdenvale to Lion's Head, Cape Chin to Tobermory I am hearing from parishioners and community members about housing shortages. How is this possible on a Peninsula where so many houses are locked up all winter long? How is it possible that people are homeless in an area with so many unoccupied homes? Is basic housing basic shelter with heat, running water, septic and hydro - a right or a privilege?

In October, a water treatment company came to my home in the North Peninsula, to service the well water filtration system. From the service technician, who has been in the business for over a decade in this area, I learnt that the bacterial content in peninsula well water is rising. These elevated bacteria levels are being observed in water samples further and further north. Not surprising, given the number of septic systems being built to support homes which do not have access to municipal sewage systems or municipal water systems. Are our poopy septic systems ultimately leaking into our water table?

Housing: the kind that is affordable or attainable relies on municipal services in order to even get built.

Affordable and attainable housing is necessary to build stable, healthy, yearround communities.

When a developer or builder has to provide their own water supply or their own sewage system for each unit they build, those costs have to be passed on to the renter or buyer. The result is housing costs which are out of reach of the ordinary person. This makes basic housing a privilege. I would like to suggest that basic housing is a right. Food, clothing, shelter, safety - aren't these basic human rights?

By digging and questioning, I am finding that there are deep pockets of concern amongst many groups of people, but how are we organizing as communities to address these concerns? And how is the lack of organizing affecting the very environment that so many of us move here to enjoy?

Can our churches offer some kind of scaffolding for community organizing, with which to tackle the housing and services shortage? If you feel we can, please get in touch with me.

Businesses Push Back Against Municipal Accommodation Tax Extension

So when the Government of Ontario put in place a mechanism for municipalities to charge a 4% tax on accommodations, a lot of municipalities including ours — jumped all over it. In MNBP it has only applied to Short-Term Accommodations for the first couple of years — residential properties that take advantage of a loophole in the law to rent by the night instead of by the year.

But the revenues generated by the Municipal Accommodation Tax have been disappointing — nowhere near covering the out-of-pocket costs MNBP is facing.

Most destinations charge MAT on all overnight accommodations, not just STAs. After listening to voters during the election campaign, MNBP's new Council set out to extend the MAT here.

They were going to implement it last summer, but delayed when they encountered heavy pushback from affected businesses. As Council considers implementing it for the summer of 2024, they are hearing from those businesses

Two delegations appeared at MNBP Council's January 8 Meeting.

Griffin Salen, Past President of **Tobermory Chamber of Commerce told** council that the business community is not in favour of extending the MAT to commercial accommodators. The original rationale for the MAT was to level the playing field — remove some of the advantage that STAs gain by not paying commercial taxes or obeying commercial regulations.

He pointed out that levying a MAT on campgrounds would be particularly unfair, given that their main competition — national park campgrounds — would not have to charge the MAT.

Salen pointed out that Chamber members are already unhappy with paid parking, which charges their

customers but has yet to produce any visible benefit. To get Chamber of Commerce members on board for the MAT extension, the community would need to see visible improvements — "You can't just keep adding tax without adding improvements and we're not seeing

He also stressed that the business community needs a lot of lead time on any new charges. A few months are not

The second delegation was Jeff Mielhausen (Bear Tracks), Wilf Laman (Lion's Head Beach Motel) and Serge Marcella (Tamarac Island Inn). They also asked Council to vote down the MAT extension proposal.

They stressed that this is not the time to add a burden to MNBP's hospitality sector. Many businesses are struggling, still recovering from the pandemic and faced with labour shortages, increased wage costs, increased insurance costs, increased propane costs and dwindling margins. They encouraged MNBP staff and council to stop thinking of tourism as a problem. Tourists aren't the problem lack of facilities is the problem. With many tourists coming back every year, motels and campgrounds are the solution, not the problem.

The problem, they said, is that Parks Canada is attracting an influx of daytrippers. It is unfair to go after a small segment of the industry — accommodators — to solve a problem they are not causing, while the national parks are making out like bandits and they're exempt from MAT.

They pointed out that the extended MAT would apply year round. What tourism expenses does the MNBP have in the winter that entitle it to add a further burden to a struggling sector?

Council will have to find a way to steer the municipality through this. They're the referee and it's always hard to satisfy

Tobermory, Pike Bay, Cape Chin Christmas Bird Count Results

The annual Christmas Bird Count in Bruce Peninsula National Park took place on December 14, 2023. It was a warm day, reaching 7C, with strong west winds. A total of 1,777 individual birds from 41 different species were spotted. The count resulted in high counts for several species, including Ring-billed Gull (40), American Crow (70). Cedar Waxwing (20), and Snow Bunting (292). The most numerous bird species found on the day was Blackcapped Chickadee (360).

Bruce Peninsula National Park Christmas Bird Count volunteers spotted a couple of uncommon winter species for this area, including:

One Black Scoter.

-One Peregrine Falcon (North American),

-One American Robin were counted.

Low counts of some species were also observed for Bufflehead (2) and Mourning Dove (0). Although Mourning Doves were spotted during the week of the Christmas Bird Count, none were

spotted on the actual day of the count which is an indication that numbers in the count area are low.

Tracking trends and outliers is one of the primary goals of Christmas Bird Counts.

The highest number of Bufflehead ever counted was 121 in 2003, and it has been observed in 40 counts. This vear was the 4th time a Black Scoter has been seen in this count, with the highest count of 24 also being in 2003.

Thirty-seven people participated in the count this year. It was an unusually warm day and it was very nice to be out in the park. While the north and east side of the park was sheltered and calm, it was windy on the west.

Central Bruce Peninsula CBC Results

The two central Bruce Peninsula CBCs were enjoyed by all who attended and have once again provided a valuable snapshot of birdlife on the peninsula at a time of year when the Bruce received

Given the mild December we've had, it probably didn't come as a shock to many participants that waterbirds were around in both greater diversity and numbers. Grebes continued to show well and while Georgian Bay was mostly absent of diving ducks, on the Huron side the largest number were recorded on the Pike Bay count to date. Raptors were clearly scarce, and the Snowy Owls we've come to expect were absent for the second CBC in a row. Finches were likewise notably absent in diversity, with only American Goldfinches and Pine Siskins showing some numbers.

The Pike Bay count was held on Friday, December 29th. All waterbodies were open and temperatures fluctuated very little from 1-4 degrees Celsius; wind stayed low at 5-12km/hr; the skies stayed mostly cloudy with some early morning fog on the coasts and some light freezing rain covered binoculars sporadically during the day. This was generally speaking very good bird watching weather though. As always, a number of species were detected during count week (3 days before and after count day) that went undiscovered on count day.

New species: Cackling Goose (cw), Tundra Śwan (21), Redhead (1), Lesser Scaup (1), Merlin (1)

Unusual species: Great Horned Owl, Barred Owl, Belted Kingfisher

High counts: Mute Swan (5), Greater Scaup (27), Bufflehead (37), Common Goldeneye (228), Hooded Merganser (53), Common Merganser (68), Redbreasted Merganser (31), Wild Turkey (249), Red-necked Grebe (11), Redbellied Woodpecker (4), Black-capped Chickadee (547), Bohemian Waxwing (310), Dark-eyed Junco (12), Northern Cardinal (30), Pine Siskin (113)

Low counts: Nothing notable Notable misses: Lapland Longspur, House Finch, Purple Finch, Snowy Owl, Red-tailed Hawk, accipiters, Common

Count Week species: Cackling Goose, Gadwall, Northern Pintail, Song Sparrow, Red-winged Blackbird, Purple Finch, Lapland Longspur... adult Golden Eagle missed by 1 day!

The Cape Chin count was held on Saturday, December 30th. Conditions were similar to the Pike Bay CBC but with no rain and some brief periods of extremely light snow fall. The sun even showed itself a few times. Barred Owl has still never been recorded on this count, which is rather astounding because it is certainly resident, as owl surveys during the current Ontario Breeding Bird Atlas have shown. Conditions for scoping grebes in the Cape Chin area of Georgian Bay were excellent and I suspect we spotted near

New species: Canada Goose (2), Mallard (2), Hooded Merganser (9)

Unusual species: Cooper's Hawk, Winter Wren and Common Merganser (8), formerly recorded only during count week, were recorded on count day for the first time, White-winged Scoter (2nd record), Great Horned Owl (3rd record)

High counts: Horned Grebe (35), Bald Eagle (14), Eastern Screech-Owl (4), Hairy Woodpecker (31), Snow Bunting (376), American Tree Sparrow (2), Pine Siskin (18)

Low counts: Ruffed Grouse (3), Herring Gull (7)

Notable misses: Brown Creeper, Bohemian Waxwing, Purple Finch and Evening Grosbeak—the last two species scarce to absent on the peninsula this

Year End Fin Clipping

Just before New Year's there was a countdown at the Bruce Peninsula Sportsmen's Association (BPSA) Fish Hatchery. No it wasn't a countdown to 2024. It was all about fish – brown trout in fact. Thirty volunteers counted thousands of yearling brown trout, then clipped their adipose fins. It was an assembly line of love dedicated to our sports fishery.

The several thousand browns, many six or seven inches long, were raised at our state of the art hatchery west of Wiarton. The fish were netted and transported from the big tanks to trays where they were carefully clipped.

BPSA Fisheries Chair Kevin Harders says "We clip the adipose fin which is on the back, the last one before the tail fin. This does not affect the fish and is for identification purposes."

"It is a ministry requirement," explained Alan Sutter, BPSA hatchery manager. "Any fish raised in an Ontario hatchery for more than 12 months must be fin-clipped."

This requirement is set by the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry. Fin clipping allows researchers and sportsmen to identify whether a fish began its life in a hatchery or spent its first year in the wild. When anglers catch a fish, one of the first things we check is if it has been clipped. Then we know if it was hatchery raised. The brown trout clipped recently, will be stocked in Colpoy's Bay in January .

The Wiarton hatchery started as little more than an outdoor tank, fed by one stream, and partially protected by a roof. These days BPSA operates its modern hatchery on an annual budget of approximately \$12,000. Half of this is provided by the Ontario Community Hatchery Program, which supports qualifying hatcheries across Ontario. The majority of the work performed by the club is done by members who volunteer their time. During an average year 50 BPSA volunteers donate over 1,500 hours raising and stocking: 75,000 Rainbow Trout fingerlings, 25,000 Rainbow Trout yearlings and 25,000 Brown Trout. Since the sixties, BPSA has stocked more than 4,000,000 fish to boost our sports fishery. In 2023 this 300-member conservation club stocked over 2,100 pounds of fish in Grey-Bruce waters.

"We are assisting sustainable recreational and sports fishing," said Sutter. We are proud of the work we do. "A lot of people come to this area to fish," said Sutter. "Anybody who wants a hatchery tour can contact us."

This Wiarton based conservation club is best known for fish stocking. However, we have other family-oriented programs that attract young and old. There's our "Invasive Species Awareness – Boot Scrubber Program", Stream Rehabilitation projects, BPSA youth and adult Archery, Tree Planting sessions, youth and adult Firearms Safety Training and our BPSA Handgun Club at our indoor range in the BPSA Clubhouse. Oh yes, don't forget our open houses and the annual BPSA Kids Fishing Derby.

Upcoming programs include our Ladies Firearms Safety program which begins January 28th, 2024 and runs every Sunday for 6 weeks starting at 6:30 pm. As a pilot project BPSA has dedicated the second Tuesday of the month at 6:45 pm for a members only rifle shoot. The

first shoot is January 9th. And there's our Youth Firearms Safety Program which kicks off January 14th, 2024. It runs every Sunday for six weeks starting at 1:00 pm. These programs take place indoors at our clubhouse shooting range.

BPSA recently affiliated with the 100-thousand member Ontario Federation of Anglers & Hunters (OFAH). OFAH is the major Canadian lobby group representing the interests of anglers and hunters. The Federation meets regularly with governments on the many issues facing the outdoors community.

Our regular BPSA club meetings are held on the last Thursday night of the month. The next session is on January 25th at 7:30 pm at the BPSA clubhouse on North Acres Road west of Wiarton. Join us if you are curious about our conservation group and our aim of preserving and enhancing fish and wildlife.



Grey Bruce O.P.P. Report Grey Bruce OPP Festive Ride Numbers Released

(GREY BRUCE, ON) - Grey Bruce Ontario Provincial Police (OPP) officers participated in the Festive Reduce Impaired Driving Everywhere (RIDE) campaign which ran from November 16, 2023, until January 1, 2024.

Across West Region, OPP officers conducted 2446 RIDE events, as a result 353 Impaired Driving related charges, and 55 Warn-Range suspensions issued

During the Festive RIDE campaign. Grey Bruce OPP officers conducted 165 RIDE events within the Grey Bruce OPP catchment area.

Officers dedicated approximately 452 hours to the Festive RIDE campaign. One driver received a warn range

drivers licence suspension. The warn range is a blood alcohol concentration between 50 milligrams and 79 milligrams.

28 drivers were charged with impaired driving related charges. This includes an immediate 90-day drivers' licence suspension and an immediate 7-day vehicle impoundment.

Drivers are reminded that the OPP conducts RIDE events throughout the year as part of its ongoing efforts to save lives on Ontario roads.

If you plan on drinking or consuming drugs, plan to not drive. Instead, arrange for a designated driver, take a taxi or public transit, or come up with another plan that takes impaired driving out of the picture.



BPEG Members Learn About Tiny Forests at January Meeting

School (PSDS). He jokingly describes it as the largest tiny forest in Ontario.

Arnold posed thought provoking questions about how we think about our landscape

our connection to it. He feels that our continued focus on economic growth, prosperity, consumerism and competition is problematic and that we need a shift in our values if we are to realistically become climate resilient.

Arnold explained the impact of land use on climate and re-emphasised that vegetation cools the landscape, for example the Greenbelt is about

The Tiny Forest serves as an educational tool that can change values and teach how to change our landscape.

The grounds of the Wiarton School were exposed to the brutal sun in summer and strong winds in winter. Transforming this stark landscape, the Tiny Forest project with the help of students, volunteers and local contractors created a 300-squaremetre forest. About 25 native species, including maples, oaks, ironwood, pine, poplar, willow, dogwood and Carolinian species like shagbark hickory and tulip tree were planted. It serves as a living classroom to demonstrate regeneration. Arnold says eco-system regeneration includes physical labour and commitment, using the analogy of raising a child.

Arnold feels that Tiny Forests are suitable for spaces around Municipal buildings, schools and churches.
